Winning a New Zealand Craftsman Training Foundation (NZCTF) overseas training award has boosted a sheet metal engineer's trade knowledge and made him a much more confident manager of projects and people.



Sam Allen went to the United States for three weeks last November to learn about the latest technology in his industry.

He kicked off his trip by attending the 2013 Fabtech Metal Forming expo in Chicago - North America's largest metal forming, fabricating, welding and finishing event - and then visited several industry-leading factories in Chicago and Los Angeles.

The goal of the trip was to research cutting technology for a new machine for Sam's employer Thorburn Engineering in Hamilton, and to assess forming technologies.

Sam is now in the process of applying the research he did during his trip by evaluating the purchasing of machinery he looked at in the USA.
